Pre-Prep News

Pre-School

The children had a wonderful Forest School session with Miss Fox, using clay and natural material to model their own faces.

Pre-Prep News

Year 1

The children have been investigating their senses this term. They have discussed why and how we use each of our senses and how they help us to learn.

The children tasted a range of interesting flavoured crisps and tried space food! After discussing a trip to the restaurant '*Dans le Noir*' the children had their own tasting experience in the dark! They also created their own pictogram based on the different eye colours in the class.









Pre-Prep News

Year 2During our English lessons the children have been writing instructions using imperative verbs. They created instructions to make cakes and then gave their instructions to a partner for them to follow and make their own cake. The children quickly learnt the importance of being precise.







The children have been learning about the Great Fire of London in 1666 and made their own Tudorstyle houses. We took them down to Forest School to see how quickly they would burn!





Year 3

The children have been learning about rocks and minerals in Science. They have learnt about the different types of rocks and the rock cycle which they enjoyed recreating with chocolate. They have also learnt about Mary Anning's fossil hunting and made their own ammonites out of salt dough! In DT they have been learning to cross stitch and used the school sewing machines to complete their masterpieces. From the way they operated the foot controls, we think they might make good Formula One Drivers!











Year 4

The children have been learning about the Romans in history this term and enjoyed their workshop from the company PERFORM. They played games, created freeze frames and learnt some very interesting facts as well as getting the chance to demonstrate their knowledge of the Romans.

The workshop leader commented many times on their great behaviour and was impressed with how much they all knew!









Year 5

The children are definitely 'in the know' when it comes to rest and relaxation. In PSHE Education, we have been discussing the stages of the sleep cycle and what optimal sleep can achieve in supporting their health and wellbeing. We have discussed what has the potential to impact their sleep, both positively and negatively, and how they can manage their sleep distractions especially as the excitement of Christmas approaches!



In Geography, the children have been researching cities in Kenya and deciding what they would like about living there. They have considered the pull and push factors of each location and are keen to book holidays to find out more!





Year 6



In REP, the children have been thinking about the key to happiness – as described in the Noble Eightfold Path in Buddhism.

They have questioned whether it would be possible to follow this way of life and discussing how effective meditation would be in ending suffering.

In IT, the children have been getting to know our Marty Robots, which can be programmed to do a range of functions using *Scratch* – including wiggling and dancing!

The robots can also have accessories attached, such as touch sensors and light sensors which we hope to include in the future.

With Christmas approaching, the children have been busy writing their own Christmas poems to create a poetry advent calendar.

They are excited to open a 'door' each day in the run up to the end of term to hear a wonderful poem, read by the poet. From Christmas trees to hot chocolate and games of family Monopoly, the children have covered all the different aspects of what makes this such a lovely time of year.







Year 7

Mrs Ridge has launched a Christmas lunch club for Year 7, and they have had the opportunity to learn how to cross stitch whilst watching a Christmas film.

The film of choice is Miracle on 34th Street (1994 version, Richard Attenborough classic), and they have worked together to thread needles and learn patience in what has been a fairly challenging task! Year 7 are invited to the green History hut at several lunch and break times between now and the holidays, and they will hopefully produce some creative pieces as a result!

In REP, they have been discussing whether 'committing sins changes you'. By comparing their views with the beliefs presented in *Genesis 3*, they have been able to hear a wide range of opinions. This was a valuable opportunity to interact and practise their self-expression!







Year 8

The children in 8L went on a trip to Chichester Theatre to see the mind-blowing live theatre production of *Life of Pi*. They have been reading the book as part of their scholarship programme and have been debating whether Richard Parker was real, so it was a brilliant opportunity to bring the text to life for them. Some pupils said the story was a metaphor for religion and that it doesn't matter what the 'right' version of events is, just that you have faith. Other pupils took the story more literally and said that Pi was trying to cope with a traumatic event (no spoilers) by personifying some animals in a magical-realist fantasy. Whatever you end up thinking, they encourage you to read the book and see the show! 8L loved it!




Science Department Pupil Voice Survey for Years 1 to 8




