Message from Mrs Keep

The start of the new term has passed in the blink of an eye, and I am delighted with how quickly the children have all settled back into routine. A number of new families have joined the school and, as always, the children have done a sterling job helping them to find their way. Thank you to everyone who has helped to welcome somebody new.

I spent two days this week away at a Woodard conference, where the theme was 'Serving the Common Good'. This felt particularly resonant with me as our whole school New Year's Resolution this year has been just that – for each child to act with the common good in mind. It is a broad aim, and one that we hope recognises the value in each small gesture that is made to benefit someone else.

This all fits in with this year's Holocaust Memorial Day theme: the fragility of freedom. Children of all ages across the school have reflected on the power of words, including the strength that comes from speaking up to prevent unkindness. I hope that this weekend, each child will find a way to use their freedom of expression for an act of kindness towards someone else.

Thanks to Mrs Shaw and Ollie Godden, our school groundsman, each child planted a tulip bulb at the start of term. Our intention is that we will all be reminded of our resolutions when the tulips come into flower, hopefully helping each of us to put renewed effort into being the better version of ourselves we all hoped for at the start of January.

Another discussion item that resonated while I was away was that nobody has certainty over what our children will be doing when they are older. The importance of being lifelong learners was a common theme, with the knowledge that the pace of change is quick and showing no sign of slowing. Being adaptable and quick-thinking, able to apply skills across the curriculum and beyond, will be one of the best ways to equip our children for their future. Similarly, teaching them to be critical analysts of what they see and hear is essential from the youngest age. In school, conversations about AI, AR and VR are of course ongoing as they have been for some time, but it is through how they learn rather than what they learn that our children will be ready for the future, whatever it may hold for them.

Social skills have always mattered, and are of increasing importance. Whilst AI continues to venture into jobs once considered robot-proof, the advantage of the very best of empathetic learners is that they will always offer something extra. Noticing those who are in need and being able to reach out to them is a skill that stretches far beyond the confines of school. The children are at their most successful when they notice if someone is in need of a friend and recognise for themselves the intrinsic value in being a good person.







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Pre-School

The children have had a wonderful start to the new term! Their new topic is *Pets and Vets* and they have been busy in our own Vets Surgery. We have had an awful lot of poorly creatures passing through, from cats and dogs to penguins and even the occasional dinosaur... They have bandaged, examined, taken x-rays and even operated on some of their patients, including a poorly Rainbow Fish. We are very much looking forward to a visit from a real vet and hope to refine our skills even further!

During one of our visits to the school library to find out more about being a vet, we were lucky to spend time with some of the children from Year 8 who helped and read stories to us, it was a lovely opportunity for the Pre-School children to mix with some of the older children at our school.

We have also been celebrating where we all come from and the different languages we can speak in Pre-School, we are so proud of all our children!









Reception

The children have been reading *Stanley Stick* by John Hegley. The children enjoyed hunting for sticks in forest school and using the sticks in their imaginative play. The sticks were used in a variety of ways including to make dens, as fishing rods, to drum rhythms, to limbo and to draw in the mud. They also draw detailed pictures of their favourite sticks using charcoal.










Year 1

The children have been engrossed in their Polar topic this half term. So far, they have worked collaboratively to research facts about polar animals, started to learn about famous polar explorers and added information to a timeline, used their teamwork skills to make marshmallow igloos and that's just the beginning!

In English work they have been learning to use 'bossy' verbs to write instructions and used their new knowledge to make a hot chocolate, which would, of course, be the perfect drink to warm a cold Polar explorer!









Year 2
Children have been doing some block printing inspired by the Japanese artist Katsushika Hokusai.
They have created prints to represent *The Great Wave*, a text we have been studying in our English lessons.







Year 3

Year 3 have begun their topic of light in Science and have been investigating the different properties of light including which materials are the most reflective. They were investigating different materials to find out which would make the best outfit for a cyclist to be seen at night.



The children have just had the most incredible visit to Lancing College Chapel. They had a tour from Father Justin who told us lots of really interesting facts about the Chapel and answered a huge number of the children's brilliant questions.

The highlight was definitely the organ playing by Father Justin, the children and Miss Atkinson!







Year 4

In Maths the children have been focusing on multiplication and division. They were asked to show what happens when a number is multiplied or divided by 10 or 100 using Base 10. Year 4 used their excellent knowledge of place value to help them solve the calculations and when presented with "Why is that the answer? Prove it." were able to articulately explain why and prove it using their resources.





From practical Maths the children moved into practical History! The company *Portals from the Past* came in and brought Anglo Saxons to life with lots of gory detail which they loved! They researched, held weapons, listened to the story of Beowulf, played games and then went into battle.

Judging by their fierce faces and brilliant team spirit their teachers would be happy to join Team Year 4 on a quest!








Year 5

Art


The children in Years 3 & 4 have been working on a Frieze to show their ideas for this year's theme of 'Food for All' for the Brighton Children's Parade.






The children in Year 5 have been working in groups, creating mythical creatures. Here are some of their fabulous beasts:










Year 6



What Schools Need to Know about

WHAT THE **ACT WILL DO**

The Online Safety Act was passed into UK law in October 2023, with the aim of establishing major new layers of protection for children when they're online. The government has pledged "a zero-tolerance approach to protecting children from online harm" – and the act certainly includes more powerful legislation which should help to safeguard young people in the digital world. Our guide summarises the key points for schools ...

HARMFUL CONTENT

ocial media sites must Social media sites must rapidly remove illegal and/or harmful content such as bullying or harassing comments; pornography; and content that supports extremist activity or encourages or depicts violence, suicide, self harm or eating disorders. If they fail to do so, they can be fined up to 10% of their global revenue while their executives may even face iail time. face iail time.

ANIMAL CRUELTY

Content featuring cruelty to animals is now prohibited, even if it originates from abroad (where the law may be different) Again, it is the platform's responsibility to remove this.

MORE TRANSPARENCY

Sites must be transparent about the hazards that any children using them could encounter – by publishing risk assessments for their platforms, for instance

HOSTING MISLEADING **ADVERTS**

Scams and fraudulent adverts must be blocked or removed, or the hosting companies are liable to be fined.

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NON-CONSENSUAL SHARING

It's now easier to convict online abusers or people who share intimate images without consent, while legislation on the criminality of deepfakes has been clarified. The new laws also relate to any individuals who even threaten to share such images. This should halp to protect were such individuals. help to protect women and girls in particular online.

REPORTING AND FILTERING

Sites should have easy reporting mechanisms for children (or their parents and carers) to flag up problems quickly. They must also provid options to filter out unwanted

AGE-RESTRICTED MATERIAL

Sites must prevent children from accessing age-inappropriate material. This includes enforcing age limits and implementing robust age verification.



The act has some specific implications for schools: it's essential that leaders understand the new legislation's scope and limitations. The act is certainly a positive step, but as artificial intelligence and other advances in tech continue to produce new challenges, schools will still need to remain extremely vigilant.

KNOW WHERE TO GET HELP

Look out for the Code of Conduct that Ofcom is creating in response to the Online Safety Act. Note that the new legislation doesn't mean an instant change: many of its elements will only come into force at the end of 2023. An Ofcom consultation on 'protecting people from illegal harms online' will be running until February 2024.

REMEMBER THE ESSENTIALS

Remain mindful of your organisation's own online activities: the legal duty for schools to maintain appropriate software monitoring and filtering, for example, will not change.

WATCH FOR FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

There are some issues on which the legislation remains less clear for now: whether it's possible for Ofcom to scan encrypted private messages (such as on WhatsApp) has yet to be resolved, for instance—making this an area where, for the moment, young people have less legal protection.

UNDERSTAND AND EXPLAIN

Staff should learn how to raise concerns with tech companies whose platforms contain anything upsetting or unpleasant. Students also need to be made aware of the newly strengthened laws relating to cyber-bullying, sexting or posting inappropriate content. Young people do make mistakes online – so the clearer their understanding of the possible consequences, the better.

ENGAGE WITH PARENTS

Schools should also explain to parents and carers the new possibilities that the Online Safety Act affords them in terms of protecting their children. Many parents may have previously felt that there was little they could do about changing online platforms' content; they now have a far greater level of support when complaining about a company or the behaviour of an individual.
