### Autumn Term 2022

It feels very strange indeed to be reflecting on my last Autumn Term at Lancing Prep Worthing. I have been so touched by all the kind and supportive comments from pupils, staff and parents, both for me and for Mrs Francesca Milling, who will be LPW's new Head from September 2023.

I am making the most of every moment in my final year at LPW and know I am leaving the school in the best possible hands for the next stage in its journey!

The first half of term always flies by, and this year we paused in early September to reflect upon and celebrate the life of Her Late Majesty, with Year 8 pupils writing some very moving poems to mark the occasion. As the term continued, our new starters settled in beautifully and there was a vibrant atmosphere around the school. Our Harvest Festivals were happy occasions, with much joyful singing and it was a pleasure to welcome parents back to these events. We collected gifts for 'Turning Tides' and we know these will make an enormous difference to those in need in our wider community. It was a busy time and the children and their teachers were certainly ready for a rest over the half term break!

It has been a creative term too, the half term pumpkin carving competition was great fun and brought forth a veritable army of carefully crafted monsters to be admired, either in school or in photographs! The next exciting event was the visit of author and illustrator, Chris Riddell. He spoke to the children from Years 2-8 for an hour. seated at a visualiser which projected his drawings onto a screen which the children could see, and they were simply transfixed (as were the staff)! How anyone can draw whilst speaking frankly and compellingly to a large group of children and not looking at the 'paper' is beyond me, but he did! His work was beautiful. Next he read one of his early years stories aloud to our youngest children from

Nursery to Year 1, before embarking on a marathon book signing session for the pupils. His personal attention to detail for each child was lovely to see and his visit will live long in our collective memories.

Anti-Bullying Week started with Odd Socks Day, where the children were invited to wear odd socks to school to celebrate their individuality. In PSHEE lessons, they explored this hugely important and very complex issue over the course of the week and completed our pupil survey which will help inform how we enhance this learning experience going forward.

As the term moved inexorably onwards, preparations for Christmas events at school loomed into view. The school was filled with music and smiling faces and the









# Spring Term 2023

#### The Spring Term has been packed full of activities, both at school and further afield. It has been truly wonderful to see our younger children making the most of their 'loving learning' experiences with more visits off site.

Year 1 had a super time at Leonardslee, meeting the wallabies and their joeys, exploring the first signs of spring returning to the gardens and discovering more about the Victorian world in the extensive Dolls House exhibition.

Back at school they teamed up with the Year 2 children for a very exciting alternative curriculum day. In mixed groups they took part in cooking, forest school and art activities. They sawed and drilled wood in Forest School to make necklaces, displayed their culinary skills baking flapjacks in the Food & Nutrition room and created fabulous owl collages in Art.

It's been some time since our older pupils had the opportunity to immerse themselves in the culture and language of France and this year's trip to Paris for Years 7 and 8 was exceptional. As one might expect, they visited the usual Parisian landmarks, such as the Tour Eiffel, and had a day out at the stunning Palace of Versailles. With opportunities to practise their French shopping in Paris and in a marketplace teeming with delights, their language skills have been enhanced immeasurably. They were such great ambassadors for the school, drawing compliments for their behaviour and politeness wherever they went and more importantly perhaps than that, they had a fantastic time!

Closer to home, for our World Book Day celebrations the school was transformed into a riot of colour, as pupils arrived dressed as characters from their favourite books. It was wonderful to see the effort that the children (and their parents) had gone to - a real celebration of their love of books. Our annual costume parade included some memorable characters: A posse of Doctors Frankenstein and one monster, Matilda (soon to be our school musical offering), Alice in Wonderland characters and a selection from Hogwarts. Courtesy of our wonderful LPWA, a masterful story teller, Jamie Crawford, came along and transfixed the children with his tales, delivered in the oral storytelling tradition.

We've also hosted some important visitors to school - the Mayor of Worthing, Councillor Henna Chowdhury, came to speak at a Prep assembly. She described











her role as Mayor, her childhood ambitions and dreams, and it was clear how much she loves Worthing. She thoughtfully answered many carefully considered questions from the pupils. Two weeks later, we welcomed local MP Mr Tim Loughton, who led a Prep assembly and took on some terrific questions from the children, ranging from his opinion on former Prime Ministers, Liz Truss and Boris Johnson, to why he supported Brexit and Climate Change, which he described as the biggest single issue for the world today. He gave the children valuable insights into the life of a politician and has invited a group of students for a trip to Parliament in the summer term. We often say that asking a good question is a brilliant way to learn and our children enjoy rising to the challenge. We hope Mr

Loughton enjoyed it too!

As part of their unit on time, travel, resilience and the power of yet, Year 6 pupils were greeted on arrival at school by a 'Back to the Future' Dolorean.

The children delighted as the Doc and Marty McFly (Mr Lucas and Mr Grimshaw) stopped by, from October 26 1985, to congratulate the children on their work.

All coaches were fully booked for the month but 'Roads? Where we're going we don't need roads!', so the children caught the train to London where they continued their time travelling experience watching Back to the Future: The Musical at the Adelphi Theatre.

Our scholars this year have been exceptional and to win the top three academic scholarships to Lancing College again was simply thrilling. Many congratulations to our determined and very highly motivated young men and women. In total, pupils at LPW earned four Academic Scholarships, two Academic Exhibitions, two Drama Scholarships, three Sports Scholarships, two Sports Exhibitions, a Ken Shearwood Award and a Head Master's award. In addition to this, two Year 6 pupils received Sports Scholarships to other senior schools and another the Brian Jay All-Rounder Scholarship to Great Ballard.



#### Summer Term 2023

This is my last article for the Lower Quad magazine, and I write with sadness to be saying goodbye but with great pride in the school I have loved for nine years.

This term, as all our terms are, has been action-packed: Numbers Day, celebrations for the Coronation of Charles III, sports days, trips, The Bannister Mile, Third Generation Day, and Matilda the Musical, to name but a few, and the pupils have risen to every occasion.

Our pupils are extraordinary. All children have the potential to be great, but sadly, some are not provided with the opportunities they need to enable them to grow and fulfil their potential. At LPW, all our children are encouraged, supported, cajoled, and perhaps most importantly, inspired. They take pride in their learning, and here it is 'cool' to learn. The teachers strive to engage them in activities and interests beyond the classroom and take a positive interest in their interests. An example of the depth of children's engagement is the topic list for the Year 8 Religion, Ethics and Philosophy independent projects completed at the beginning of this term, which includes: 'Will reporting on the gender pay gap make a positive change for women?' 'What is the human cost of cobalt in batteries?' 'Genetic Engineering: Is it ever right to 'play God?'

This year we put on our annual school musical, 'Matilda'. The children rehearsed the musical numbers and choreography enthusiastically at school in preparation for three outstanding performances at the Lancing College Theatre. Families and friends came along to enjoy the extraordinary talent that was on show.

Our Third Generation Day this year was celebrated with a host

of fun activities and celebrations. Nursery and Reception children enjoyed a bouncy castle, teacup ride, and face painting, while Year 1 and 2 visited Paultons Park and Years 3–8 visited Chessington. Everyone had a fantastic time, and we owe a big thank you to our wonderful Parents' Association, who do so much to enhance our children's experience at school.

Once again, Year 8 worked in collaboration with the Worthing Archaeological Society on a dig in the corner of our school field to uncover any remnants of the former Broadwater Manor outbuildings that it is believed were demolished at some point in the first part of the 20th century. We didn't find any buried treasure, sadly, but there were a number of artefacts unearthed. It was very exciting,











and the younger year groups can't wait to dig up the rest of the field when their time comes!

Sports days were celebrated wonderfully again this year. The children were exceptional and gave their all during the events. The younger children competed in the egg and spoon, bean bag, and sack races. The older pupils competed in the 80m, 150m, and 600m races along with an obstacle course, finishing with a lovely picnic on the school field. Thank you to all our lovely families for coming along to support us. The children had a great day.

We were delighted to hold our endof-year celebration at the College Chapel, with prizes handed out and tributes paid to our Year 8 pupils as their time with us drew to a close. We are so proud of these young people and all that they have achieved in their time with us.

Shortly after I started here, an inspirational young teacher with huge potential mentioned to me that she was anxious about speaking in assembly. Of course, I made it a target for her and set a date to enable her to give it a go and overcome her nerves. To this day, that assembly is one of the best I have ever seen, and at the end of it, she gave every child and every member of staff a card to keep that said, 'Go into the world and do well. But more importantly, go into the world and do good'. It is from this teacher and from this assembly that our third aim arose, and it has

prompted a multitude of positive actions from the children and their teachers, some private and heartfelt, and some that are supported by the whole school. Our Bannister Mile sponsored run, which took place on Broadwater Green in June, is a good example. That teacher was Mrs Francesca Milling, and it is Francesca who will be the new Head of this school when I retire in July. Francesca is the perfect person to lead the school forward and inspire the children. I am excited and pleased for her and the school community, and I can leave with the knowledge that this school and its children are safe with her.




