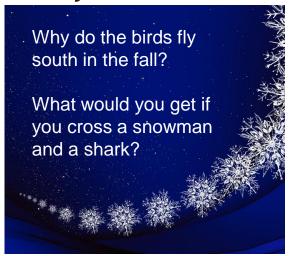

Make a noise about bullying



Anti-Bullying week is $13^{th} - 17^{th}$ November and this year's theme is Make some Noise! Anti-Bullying week is to encourage you to think about what bullying means to you, how banter can turn into something more hurtful, and what we can do to stop it.

What is Bullying?

When someone says or does something unintentionally hurtful, and they do it once –

That's a mistake

When someone says or does something intentionally hurtful, and they do it once – That's mean and unkind

When someone says or does something intentionally hurtful, and they keep doing it even when you tell them to stop or show them you are upset – That's bullying

What should I do?

- 1) Remember it's not your fault
- 2) Get help talk to someone you trust
- 3) Keep a record write what is happening down with dates and times
- 4) Know your friends spend time with them, surround yourself with people who care
- 5) Practice standing up for yourself Say Stop and grow your confidence
- 6) Remember, no one has the right to hurt you
- 7) Seek a place of safety- walk away
- 8) Love yourself tell yourself you are amazing and do things you enjoy and make you feel good about yourself
- 9) Stand up for others and grow your confidence to say NO!

Who can I talk to?

Talk to someone who can help you and give you advice; family, friends, a trusted adult, a teacher. There are other ways to get help too.

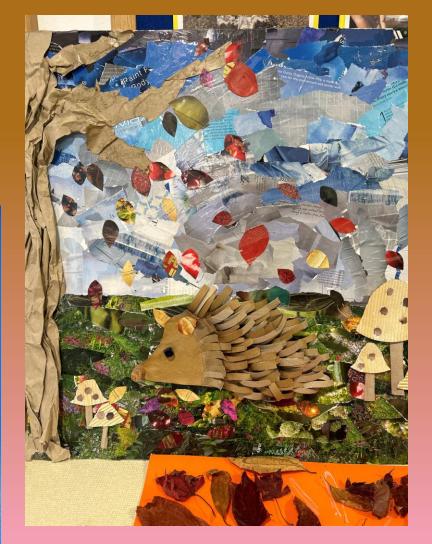
