This year, our **School Council** has been a driving force for positive change, working hard to gather pupil voice and enhance school life. At the start of the academic year, members designed and distributed suggestion boxes to every form group, encouraging all pupils to share ideas and feedback. ISI Inspection

In May 2025, Lancing Prep Worthing was inspected under ISI's new framework, Framework 23, which came into effect in September 2023. The inspection took place over four days and during that time inspectors observed scores of lessons, met with pupils and a wide range of teaching and non-teaching staff, as well as members of our Governing Body. Questionnaires were sent to all parents, pupils and staff, and responses analysed in detail.

Under Framework 23, schools no longer receive a one-word judgement or grade; instead, pupil experience is scrutinised under four key areas:

- Leadership and management
- Quality of education
- Pupils' physical, mental and emotional wellbeing
- Pupils' social and economic education and contribution to society

The report reflects the excellence of Lancing Prep Worthing and the superb nature of our care and work with pupils, both within and beyond the classroom. We are recognised to meet all the standards and regulations governing the running of an independent Prep School and to be compliant in all areas.

We are delighted that the inspectors have recognised so many aspects of Lancing Prep Worthing life that we are immensely proud of too.

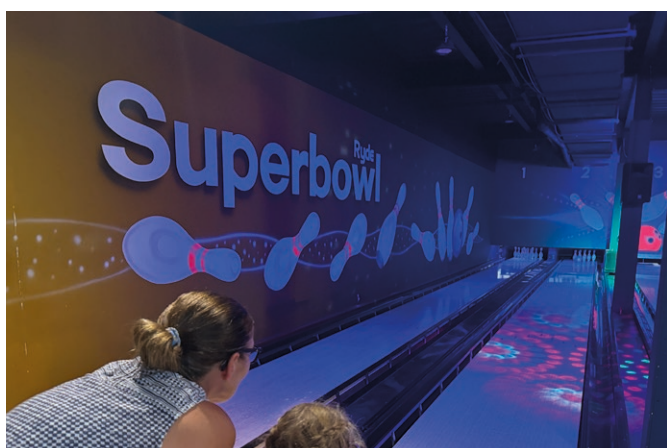
Third Generation Day

Pre-loved uniform

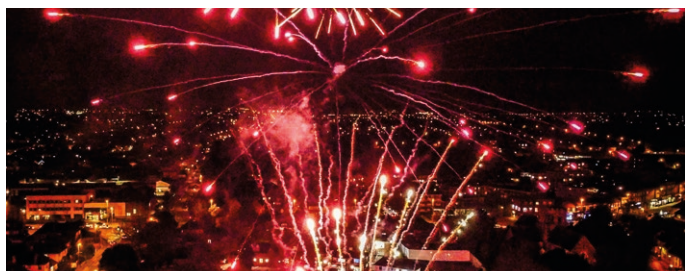

The Aspire Programme at Lancing Prep Worthing

Launched in Spring 2024, the Aspire Programme has quickly become a central pillar of our outreach and partnership work. It is designed not simply as an initiative, but as a sustained commitment to meaningful collaboration between schools – creating opportunities that benefit pupils, staff and the wider community.

Through Aspire, we have developed strong and purposeful partnerships with local schools, as well as joining the Schools Partnership Alliance. This has enabled rich opportunities for shared practice, professional dialogue and mentoring, both for pupils and for staff, ensuring that collaboration is active, reciprocal and impactful.

We are proud that, in its first year, four pupils have joined our school through the Aspire Programme, reflecting our commitment to widening access and nurturing potential. While the introduction of the Aspire Scholarship remains a key long-term ambition, current financial planning indicates a projected launch in 2030, marking the centenary of our building. In the meantime, the programme has been successfully supported through charitable grants, and we are actively exploring additional funding streams, including engagement with our alumni community, to secure and expand its future.

Our ongoing work with NACE (the National Association for Able Children in Education) further strengthens the programme, ensuring that high-ability learners benefit from research-informed provision and challenge. Aspire has already delivered a broad and inclusive programme of enrichment opportunities, including Saturday morning sessions in English, Mathematics, Science, Languages, Sport and Team-Building. In addition, themed events such as a summer STEAM programme

and an autumn technology workshop have provided engaging, high-quality experiences for local children.

At the end of the Summer Term, Mrs Milling and Miss Bennet attended the School Partnerships Alliance Summer Forum at Eastbourne College. They were both part of the leadership panel, discussing our partnership initiatives, including the Aspire Programme, affordable after-school tuition and partnership events. It was a fantastic afternoon, hearing how other schools are building partnerships, and they brought back valuable insights and ideas to strengthen our partnership framework.

Our Head, Mrs Milling, and Deputy Head, Miss Townsend, also visited a local state school, Arundel Church of England School, to speak with their Year 5 pupils about life in Years 7 and 8 at Lancing Prep Worthing. They enjoyed answering the children's questions and sharing what makes our school such a special place to learn and grow.

At its heart, Aspire is about building a shared culture of ambition. It reflects our belief that partnerships should be authentic, sustained and mutually beneficial and that when schools work together, both young people and teachers are empowered to aspire to more, achieving outcomes that extend far beyond what any one school could deliver alone.



Life in Our Local Community

One of our school's core aims is to make a positive impact on the world, and it brings us immense joy to witness our pupils consistently demonstrate such generosity and thoughtfulness.

As the Autumn Term unfolded, we kicked off the year with a heartfelt celebration at the Harvest Festival, a perfect moment to express gratitude and share all that we have. Building on our prior support for Turning Tides, a charity dedicated to helping individuals facing homelessness or at risk in West Sussex, this year the children chose to extend their generosity once again. We were incredibly grateful to the children and their families for their overwhelming contributions of breakfast items, cleaning supplies, snacks, long-life meals and personal hygiene products.

Academic News

We continue to foster a love of learning in all our pupils, empowering them to reach their full academic potential. Our comprehensive and balanced curriculum is enriched with engaging creative and physical activities, creating a dynamic and inspiring learning environment.

Mathematics News

This academic year has been another exciting and successful one for Maths across the school, with a continued focus on building confidence, problem-solving skills and enjoyment of the subject. The **White Rose Maths** approach has remained central to our teaching, supporting clear progression and deep understanding across all year groups.



Our fourth whole-school Maths Day was a highlight of the year. Working with Subject Revolution, pupils took part in the immersive Castle Escape experience, with KS2 and KS3 tackling the challenging Raven Chests and KS1 embarking on the imaginative Dragon Quest. The day encouraged teamwork, resilience and logical thinking and was followed by a range of creative Maths activities within year groups, each inspired by different books. This cross-curricular approach helped pupils see Maths in new and engaging contexts.

Pupils from Years 5 to 8 continued to participate enthusiastically in a range of Maths competitions, achieving excellent results and demonstrating growing confidence in tackling unfamiliar problems.

We were particularly pleased for Beau H (Year 8) and Francesca G (Year 7) who both qualified for follow up rounds to the **UK Junior Maths Challenge**. This is an inclusive challenge for our pupils, which also provides opportunities for able, gifted and talented mathematicians to compete nationally. Francesca achieved a Bronze in the Junior Kangaroo and Beau a Merit in the Junior UK Olympiad.

We were also delighted to see strong performances in scholarship assessments, with pupils achieving highly and securing awards.

Overall, it has been a year of enthusiasm and achievement in Maths and we look forward to building on this success next year.

Science News

(Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics)

It has been an exciting and engaging year for the Science Department, with pupils across the school immersed in practical investigations and hands-on learning. Older pupils explored a wide range of topics, from classification using pooters and pitfall traps to collect invertebrates, to heart and lung dissections, electrical circuits and the study of light through reflection experiments. KS3 classes extracted DNA from strawberries, created electromagnets and carried out neutralisation reactions. Year 8 worked hard at the end of the year to design and carry out their own independent Science Fair projects.



STEM Club has been particularly popular, with pupils tackling exciting STEM challenges, making scribble bots, doing Chemistry challenges and even having a visit from a vet and looking at some blood samples under microscopes.

In Pre-Prep, Year 1 pupils loved their spring topic on plants and growing. They planted beans and sunflowers, carefully measuring growth and counting leaves over four weeks in their diaries. They are now continuing to monitor their sunflowers at home. During their *Animals Including Humans* topic, they used stethoscopes to listen to heartbeats and even made their own. A visit to the beach and beach office allowed them to explore marine life, observe rescued crabs and fish, plus participate in a beach clean.

Year 2 pupils also enjoyed a wide variety of activities, including creating a mini pond to study habitats, investigating temperature and plant growth, testing waterproof materials and learning about life cycles and healthy living. Their visit to the Chichester Planetarium further enriched their understanding of space.

Pupils have proudly represented the school in the Galactic Challenge, a Year 6 Science Challenge at Lancing College and a Science quiz competition, demonstrating teamwork, curiosity and enthusiasm for Science.

English News

The English Department has celebrated a highly successful Year of Reading, with a range of exciting opportunities designed to inspire pupils and foster a lifelong love of literature. As our school has grown, we have maintained our commitment to individual attention and members of the Senior Leadership Team regularly read alongside pupils each day, helping to model and promote positive reading habits across the school. Once our Year 8 scholars had finished their exams, they joined the reading revolution and gave back to their community by regularly visiting younger pupils to hear them read.

A particular highlight has been welcoming several visiting authors to school. Younger pupils enjoyed engaging sessions with Jim Beckett, author of the *Buzz Sausage Wolf* series, and Josh Lacey, who introduced pupils to his popular *The Time Travel Twins* books. KS3 pupils were also privileged to hear from acclaimed author Sarah Crossan, whose powerful insights into the importance of reading to build empathy left a lasting impression.



World Book Day was another highlight, with the theme of fantasies and fairytales being fully embraced by our whole school community. The children looked wonderful in their imaginative costumes. From dragons and wizards to princesses, woodland creatures and brave adventurers. The school was filled with colour, creativity and the joy of stories brought to life, making it a truly enchanting day for us all.

Alongside our focus on reading, the Department has worked tirelessly to develop pupils' love of writing. This has been supported through a whole-school approach that used imaginative writing hooks to spark creativity and curiosity. Memorable events included Year 8 pupils unexpectedly appearing in lessons dressed as wild animals and the mysterious arrival of a crashed rocket ship on the school playground. These experiences generated excitement across the school and inspired pupils to produce a wide range of creative and thoughtful writing.

The enthusiasm for writing has also been reflected in pupils' participation in both poetry and prose competitions, with many children proudly submitting work of an exceptionally high standard. Together, these initiatives have helped create a vibrant culture of reading and writing throughout the school.

Geography News

This year in Geography, our pupils had an incredible time celebrating diverse cultures from around the world. Year 6 pupils created fantastic projects exploring the culture and country of Kenya. Year 7 pupils explored the streets of Broadwater to learn about land use and conducted environmental quality surveys, which they documented in their coursework.

We also launched the second year of our Global Friendship Club, an afterschool programme where we partner with six schools worldwide. Children write letters, research different countries and connect via online meetings – building friendships and global understanding.

Additionally, our Head of Geography travelled to Illinois, USA, to meet international teachers and strengthen global links that will benefit our pupils. What an exciting year of learning and connection!



History News

Pupils at LPW love History, and their interest and enthusiasm – whether it's learning about Victorians in Year 3 or finding out more about the Tudors in Year 5 – is absolutely infectious!

We were delighted to have eight pupils step forward for the challenging national competition, the Townsend Warner. We also had some very hardworking pupils from Year 6 enter the Primary History competition. Year 6 pupils delivered a variety of wonderfully researched projects on a range of 20th century topics, including the invention of the internet and Eddie the Eagle! Year 8 pupils chose a key local location to research and delivered projects on Tottington Manor, Brighton City Airport and Bramber Castle, among other exciting sites.

Pupils from Years 5–8 came together for our annual *Strictly Come Historic Dancing*, a fun event combining history with dance. Each year group learned a dance connected with the period that they were studying in history. There was a lot of laughter, learning and fun!



Religion, Ethics and Philosophy (REP) News

Pupils across the school enjoyed special meals to celebrate some key religious days in Judaism, Sikhism, Hinduism, Islam and Buddhism. We are grateful to the local faith leaders who guided us in selecting the correct food, and to Mr Bell, our amazing chef, for creating such wonderful delicacies for the children. Pupils debated a wide variety of topics within REP such as whether it is okay to bully a bully, and which is more important: animals or our planet? The Year 8 pupils selected a wide variety of topics to debate including what respect means, and whether PE should be compulsory. It was fantastic to see the range of topics and ideas that were put forward by pupils wishing to plan how to set up a charity, and the range of enterprising ideas they had to raise money.



Modern Foreign Language (MFL) News

This year in Modern Foreign Languages, pupils have explored French through a vibrant range of literature, building confidence, creativity and enjoyment.

In Year 1, *Conti-Conta* (Saudo & Grandgirard) and Hervé Tullet's *Un livre* introduced pupils to French via rhythm, movement and interaction, bringing language to life from the very start.

In Year 2, pupils revisited these favourites while expanding their repertoire with *Maman* (Ramos), *Abécédaire* (Estellon) and *Pop mange de toutes les couleurs* (Sanders), deepening vocabulary and expressing ideas through stories and colour.

In Year 3, *Conti-Conta* and *Roule galette* fostered storytelling skills and encouraged pupils to retell and act out tales with growing confidence.

In Year 4, pupils explored a rich collection including *Les trois petits cochons*, *Le Petit Chaperon rouge*, *La petite poule rousse* and *La grenouille qui avait une grande bouche*, alongside *Roule galette* and a Paris-themed text, strengthening cultural understanding.

In Year 5, creative choices in *You Choose: Fairy Tales* and lively narratives such as *La grosse faim de p'tit bonhomme* inspired imagination and discussion.

In Year 6, pupils engaged with *Devant ma maison* and several *galette* stories, recognising patterns and building fluency.

In Year 7, *Goliath*, *chat pirate* developed independence with longer texts.

Finally, in Year 8, pupils compared three versions of *Le corbeau et le renard*, exploring how classic literature can be adapted across time and language levels.

Both Year 7 and Year 8 pupils have benefitted from weekly MFL sessions at Lancing College where they learn Spanish and German.



Across the school, this shared journey through stories has not only supported language learning but also sparked curiosity, empathy and creativity. From playful picture books to timeless fables, pupils have discovered that learning French can be joyful, meaningful and full of imagination.

Sports News

This academic year marked a significant chapter in the history of sport at Lancing Prep Worthing. In the Spring Term, we bade farewell to Mr Richards, who stepped down as Director of Sport after 24 years of dedicated service.

Throughout his tenure, Mr Richards played a key role in shaping a highly respected sporting programme, providing countless chances for pupils to participate, compete and excel. Alongside esteemed Head of Girls' Games, Mrs Fudge, and dedicated sports teacher Ms Jakobsen – both also leaving this summer – he helped foster a sporting culture rooted in enthusiasm, inclusivity, excellence and enjoyment. Their commitment and passion have left a lasting legacy that will benefit generations of LPW pupils.

While this transition marks the end of an era, it also heralds an exciting new chapter. Mr Marshman has taken on the role of Director of Sport and has already made a positive impact with his vision to enhance and expand our sporting offerings. He emphasises the importance of sport within a child's broader education, recognising its vital role in building confidence, resilience, teamwork and wellbeing. Recent initiatives such as improved fixture experiences, a more inclusive Pre-Prep Sports Day, weekly sports bulletins, and a school-wide World Cup have increased engagement and participation

across the school. Looking ahead, the establishment of a Sports Committee and Sports Ambassador Scheme will create leadership opportunities for pupils and help ensure the continued growth of sport at LPW.

This year has been filled with memorable achievements, exciting ventures and outstanding performances. We celebrate the successes of our pupils and the ongoing importance of sport in school life. Whether representing the school, developing new skills in lessons, or taking part in clubs and festivals, our pupils have embraced every challenge with enthusiasm and determination.

Throughout the year, pupils engaged in a broad range of sports including: football, netball, hockey, cricket, tennis, swimming, and cross-country. Additional activities like tag rugby, table tennis and golf offered chances for pupils to challenge themselves and try new sports. The launch of a golf club during the Autumn Term allowed pupils to refine their skills and compete in school events, with some representing LPW in external tournaments. We also strengthened our links with local clubs to support pupils' growth beyond school.

This year, our co-curricular programme has been rich in opportunity, where learning has extended far beyond the classroom and every child has had the chance to explore new passions and discover their potential.

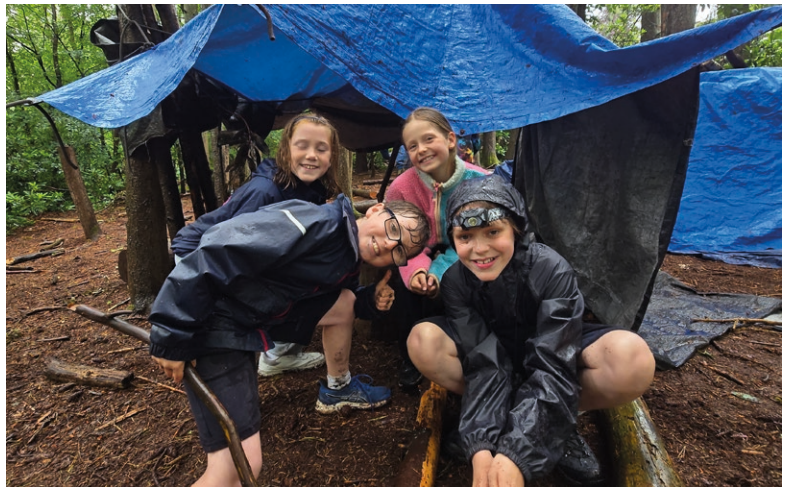
Our academic enrichment programme has been vibrant and diverse, offering pupils a wealth of opportunities to deepen their learning and challenge themselves. From engaging Modern Foreign Language (MFL) sessions and carousel activities at Lancing College, to a wide range of clubs and pupil-led initiatives, pupils have taken ownership of their learning in inspiring ways. A highlight of our pupils' achievements this year has been the energy and independence they have shown through pupil-led clubs. These have included a Stamp Club, a Reading Club and a Maths Club. Competitions and challenges have pushed pupils to excel. Events such as the Year 8 Science Fair, Bake-Off and the Townsend-Warner History Competition showcased creativity, critical thinking and enthusiasm. In the Autumn Term, a group of choir singers from Years 7 and 8 attended the Lancing College Prep Schools' Choral Day. This was a fantastic opportunity for our musicians to join with pupils from other prep schools to work on learning new pieces over the course of a whole afternoon, culminating with Evensong in the beautiful Lancing College Chapel. Everyone enjoyed the challenge of learning new music in 2- and 3-part harmony, and the sound made by so many different voices coming together was simply glorious.

Our Harvest festival celebrations were attended by many families. At the Prep Harvest Celebration, Orchestra, Senior Ensemble, Brass and Wind Ensemble, Years 3 & 4 and Years 5 & 6 choirs all performed alongside poetry readings and hymns. The Pre-Prep Harvest

Celebration took place in school where Nursery and Pre-School, Reception, Years 1 and 2 gave fantastic and vibrant performances of their favourite autumn songs. Meanwhile, 11 pupils took ABRSM music exams, resulting in a 100% pass rate with one pupil gaining a Distinction.

Drama continues to flourish, with pupils across the school embracing opportunities to perform, create and build confidence. From LAMDA examinations and weekly Drama lessons to Drama Club and preparations for our annual musical, this year has been packed with creativity, teamwork and plenty of fun.

The year began at full speed, with auditions and rehearsals for our 2026 production of *Newsies* getting underway almost immediately for Years 6 to 8. Alongside this, pupils enjoyed a busy programme of Drama Club activities, scholarship preparation and LAMDA lessons.

Many pupils also benefit from weekly drama lessons as part of the curriculum, where they explore a variety of texts, poetry, improvisation and performance techniques, developing confidence, creativity and teamwork with the support of the brilliant LPW teaching staff.

We are fortunate to have a thriving Drama Department, with nearly all pupils involved in some form of voluntary dramatic activity. This year, an impressive 84 pupils from Years 1 to 8 participated in weekly LAMDA lessons, studying a wide range of disciplines including acting, verse and prose, Shakespeare and musical theatre. Art & Design Technology

This year has seen a brilliant range of outcomes in Art and Design Technology for pupils.

They have had the opportunity to experience projects which have nurtured and grown their creative skills whilst exploring the works of artists and designers from a plethora of cultures and backgrounds. Beyond the classroom, our pupils have engaged in Art and Craft clubs and entered national competitions including the IAPS Art competition. More recently, pupils have worked to help produce props for *Newsies*, this year's school musical.

The Art curriculum began this year with a drawing project including pupils from Year 1 to Year 8 entitled *An apple a day*. Each pupil made a drawing of an apple inspired by the still life work of Paul Cezanne. This large body of work was displayed altogether, showing the natural progression as pupils move through the school.

In terms of scholarship success, our four Year 8 Art and DT scholars worked incredibly hard with great maturity this year and their portfolios displayed a collection of personal outcomes finished to a very high standard. As a result, one pupil attained a Ken Shearwood All-Rounder Scholarship with Design Technology and another pupil gained an Art Exhibition.

In Reception class, the children made collage fish, demonstrating fantastic imagination and creative problem solving. After this, their penguin crafts beautifully reflected each child's personality and growing artistic confidence.

In Year 1, pupils created paintings of animals for their British wildlife and Australia topics. They studied the artist Claude Monet and replicated his waterlilies paintings using different techniques to create the water. They also made bird feeders, digeridoos, boomerangs, crabs and clay diva lamps.

In Year 2, pupils looked closely at the colour wheel, paying particular attention to where the hot and cold colours sat. They studied artists including Georgia O'Keefe and created their own hot colour, abstract art, based on the Great Fire of London. During the Summer Term, the children explored a range of artists and textile traditions while developing their

drawing skills. Their work was inspired by the theme *Africa*, allowing them to experiment with a variety of techniques and creative approaches.

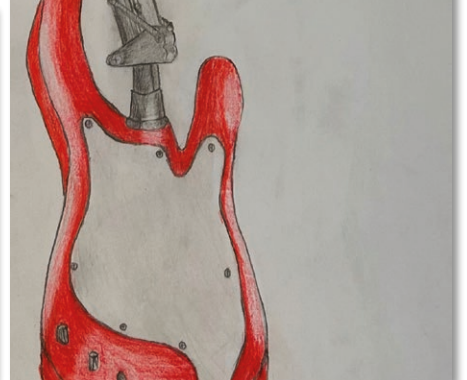
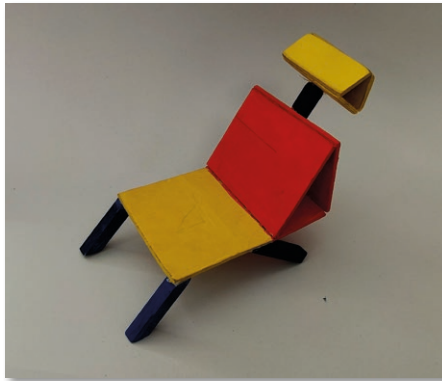
In Year 3, pupils learnt how to tapestry weave, made pneumatic monsters, made a series of artists playing cards and crafted ceramic pinch pots. In Year 4 they made continuous line paintings based on Paul Klee, constructed embroidered abstract expressionist felt, made animal collages inspired by Mark Hearld, built animal levers constructions and crafted puppets based on animals of the Arctic. In Year 5, pupils developed their own picture book stories after attending an online talk by award winning illustrator and animator Mikey Please, poly-block printed and sewed fabric baskets and built their own wooden house structures.

Year 6 engaged in 3D still life sculptures, experimented with surface design including batik, collaged mono-print self-portraits and constructed CAM toys. Year 7 embarked on expressive mark-making in paper sculpture, made reduction poly-block prints inspired by Rosalind Monks and crafted wooden clocks inspired by the Memphis Group.

In Year 8, a highlight was a workshop delivered by recent RCA graduate and Tracy Emin studio residency recipient Ruby Read. In the workshop, Ruby presented an artist's talk and gave pupils insight into her practice by demonstrating how she builds colour in her paintings. As a result of this generous presentation, pupils produced some outstanding paintings that used paint in an expressive and tactile manner. Later in the year, they also completed a *De Stijl Product Design* project which saw them designing a model chair inspired by the art movement.

This year has seen a jam-packed curriculum and pupils have embraced their creative learning with infectious energy and invention. We are very proud of the many achievements of our pupils in Art and DT and look forward to another bumper year ahead.





Wellbeing News

Pastoral care and pupil wellbeing sit at the very heart of our school community, underpinning everything we do to ensure that every child feels safe, valued and ready to learn.

We recognise that emotional wellbeing is fundamental to academic success, and we therefore provide a nurturing environment where children are encouraged to express themselves, build resilience and develop positive relationships with peers and adults alike.

Our Zones of Regulation wellbeing approach and Learning Powers are in full flow and interwoven throughout all our curriculum and pastoral care, providing positive support, development and growth for our children and young people. Our children are thriving.

Throughout this academic year, we have actively promoted mental health awareness through a range of carefully planned events and initiatives. One of the highlights was Hello Yellow Day, where pupils and staff came together dressed in yellow to raise awareness of young people's mental health. This vibrant and inclusive event provided an opportunity for meaningful conversations about feelings, kindness and support networks, while also reinforcing the importance of looking after ourselves and one another. Similarly, Children's Mental Health Week was marked with assemblies, classroom activities and reflective discussions, empowering pupils to understand emotions, develop coping strategies and recognise the value of seeking help when needed.

We are particularly fortunate to benefit from strong links with our community, including regular visits from PC Chris Marsden, whose sessions with pupils focus on PSHEE topics including safety, trust and emotional wellbeing. His approachable manner helps children feel comfortable discussing worries, while reinforcing important messages about staying safe both in and out of school. In addition to these structured events, we are proud to introduce an exciting and much-loved addition to our pastoral provision: our therapy dog, who visits the school regularly to support pupils' wellbeing. This gentle and friendly companion has quickly become a favourite among the children, especially during reading sessions, where pupils can sit, relax and read aloud in a calm, non-judgemental environment.

Throughout this academic year, our dedicated wellbeing room, The Hive, has been buzzing with visits from the children. They play friendly games with their peers and take time to sit quietly, reflect and rebalance. For those who need a little extra time and support, we provide this through our drop ins or through emotional literacy therapeutic programmes. Here's what some of our pupils say about the Hive:

“ A nice place where you can express your emotions and be who you want to be, you don't need to hide, and you can get what's troubling you out.

I used to just think that angry was bad, but now I understand it is an emotion that is telling me something is wrong.

Sometimes on a rainy day you can go to the Hive and have fun.

You can do Restorative Justice with people who you didn't get a good start with or don't get on with if something has happened. It feels free, comforting, warm and a nice place to be.

Plus, I get to see the school guinea pig, Nugget.

Alongside these initiatives, our team of teachers and support staff are always attentive to the individual needs of each child, ensuring that pastoral support is embedded in daily school life. Through open communication, dedicated support systems and

a strong culture of care and kindness, we strive to create an environment in which every pupil can flourish both emotionally and academically, and can *Be Kind, Love Learning and Go Out into The World and Do Good*.
